The three day annual Fruit and Vegetable Market brings in very welcome funds towards the translating of the bible into other languages and distributing copies to those who cannot afford to buy a copy. All the fruit and vegetables are donated by farmers from the Addo and wider area around Gqeberha.

When the Revd Hein Barnard visited

Holy Trinity in Central on Sunday 26 March, he explained that bibles are sold from Bible House at below cost so that they are affordable to most people. He said that there are audible and large print versions for the visually impaired, braille bibles for the blind and they have just produced a special version for dyslexic readers. He then challenged the congregation to take a pill box container and fill it with either R2 or R5 pieces and return it within three months in order to try and cover a chart he had given the parish.
